

REMEMBER WHEN



By Ron Underwood, CHSSA Historian and Hall of Fame member

Fifty-five years ago - State Tournament at UC Santa Barbara | Director: Dr Upton Palmer. Anticipating tabroom problems, Dr. Palmer told all coaches that there would be "absolute secrecy" in the tabroom. "Every chairman should be free from annoying breath on their respective necks."

Forty-five years ago - State tournament at UCLA | Director: Richard Gustafson. Sweepstakes: Ist Damien & 2nd La Mirada. OI was eliminated as a state event and it was replace with Expository. College and community judges were paid \$2 per round. \$25 judging deposit for each school was initiated. CHSSA Hall of Famer Larry Smith remembers:

"I had what turns out to be the most difficult job at the tournament-assigning judges. The problem we faced that year was the headquarters and judges were located in the union, ten minutes away, up the hill. The tournament was running considerably behind time because of this "walk lag," and we were trying to get a round of debate started before 10PM. Not enough judges were present. I jumped into my station wagon , dashed to the Holiday Inn and took the elevator to the dining room. There I found a large contingent of coaches who were well into their dinner hour. I asked if anyone would like to go to a debate party. Receiving acceptance from a half dozen, I piled them into the wagon and made a dash back to the university. As I stuffed ballots into their hands I promised the party would start immediately after the round was over. There was some grumbling ,but what the heck, they were there and it was a five mile walk back to the hotel...So they judged. I never knew how well the decisions were made, but the rounds did finish. And we did party afterwards."

Thirty-five years ago - State Tournament at Cal State San Diego | Director: Jim McDonnell. Sweepstakes: Ist West Bakersfield 2nd Kennedy Richmond. Ballot review was established. Traveling sweepstakes was eliminated

Twenty-five years ago - State Tournament at Ventura Community College | Director: Ron Underwood. Sweepstakes: Ist Bellarmine & 2nd West Bakersfield and Miramonte (tie). New Hall of Famers included: Ann Cierley, Jim Harville, Tom Montgomery, Ray Schaefer, and Sandy Oliveras. First time we had 18 semi-finalists for each event.

Fifteen years ago - State Tournament at Cal State San Bernardino | Director: Reed Niemi. Sweepstakes: Ist Bellarmine 2nd James Logan. Added "Ted Turner", soon to be "Controversy", soon to be Public Forum as a state event. Lifted ban on note taking by debate observers. Congresspersons could use visual-aides. (*NOTE: THIS IS NO LONGER TRUE*.)

As your peers across the country have shown the world, there is nothing that you cannot do. Always remember to **listen**, **think**, **speak**, **educate**, **enlighten**, and **empower**. That's what speech and debate, and CHSSA, is about.





"Speech and debate means freedom. You can sing, dance, act, debate, write, draw, and so much more. There's something for everyone. You are never conformed into an identity you didn't choose for yourself. Being an immigrant, I battled with my identity for so long because of all the different personas I felt like I had to achieve. I had to be the culturally enriched African child, while simultaneously embracing the Black American identity. Speech and debate helped me realize that I have the freedom to love both worlds. I found the freedom to speak about the struggles of being a teenaged immigrant. I found the freedom to be a confident Black American woman whose voice was heard.

I found the freedom to be unapologetically me.

Bringing people together is a powerful necessity that leads to

change and improvement, which is why speech and debate is a crucial puzzle piece of our communities. Forensics makes our communities whole. Through what we do, you meet a variety of people who you wouldn't have met otherwise. Because of speech and debate, I have witnessed football players and drama kids become friends; "jocks" and "nerds" clashing into one.

Speech and debate is a community in itself that creates an environment of inclusion,

one that contributes to our adulthood by helping us become inclusive and kind within the world we are a part of. We must have the courage to put a spotlight on voices that are often silenced. In the end, success is measured by your bravery to conquer anything that challenges you."

"The ability to use my voice for positive change has had an immense impact on me. With family members who are Mexican immigrants and Puerto Ricans affected by the recent current political hurricane, injustices have been incredibly personal. Forensics has given me an outlet to advocate for a better society and helped me realize my dreams of being a civil rights lawyer and Congressman who serves the people in need across our country. It is rare for young people to have the opportunity to speak their minds without censorship, condemnation, or judgment. The lack of these opportunities make it that much more important to have forensics programs available to students to give them a platform to speak up for causes that are important.

Speech and debate students must be advocates because the incredible talents gained from these events shouldn't be used just for tournaments, but should be utilized to create a true impact in our world.

Injustices occur every day and the only way to combat them is to speak up and stand up for those who cannot. Thurgood Marshall once said, "Where you see wrong or inequality or injustice, speak out, because this is your country. This is your democracy. Make it. Protect it. Pass it on." If we don't use our speaking abilities to fight for a better nation, then who else will?"

"After working to advocate for prevention, awareness, and aide for relationship violence victims, I have personally witnessed that forensics students have a charisma that helps convey a message with a confidence that audiences recognize.

It is important for speech and debate students to be advocates,

because we know how to truly engage audiences, ensuring that important messages are conveyed in the most impactful manner. Growing up, I had very few "creative" talents. I could not draw a stick figure, write poems, think of innovative science experiments, etc., so I always felt like I was just a person who lacked the spark to create. After joining Forensics, I was able to discover and use my own creative talents. Speech and Debate helps develop the important skill confident articulation, of creative argumentation, and encourages all of us to become informed on world issues. Spending hours on each speech, finding new methods to connect with a wider audience, creating intriguing introductions, and combining heartfelt with humor, was what made me feel original. Forming these ideas helps students develop vital critical thinking skills.

The way to truly measure your success in life is whether or not your actions create a positive effect on the people around you."



IN MEMORIAM



Anyone who knew Charles Philip Ballingall will tell you that he was an exceptional human being. Chuck, or Mr. Ballingall as we knew him, fully lived E.E. Cumming's observation that the most wasted of all days was one without laughter.

For 25 years, Chuck served as a member of the CHSSA Executive Council, where he worked to foster an equal playing field in speech and debate for all students. This belief in fairness wasn't just talk: summers were spent creating evidence packets that were distributed statewide, free of charge, to any team who wanted or needed them. Chuck was also instrumental in the addition of Public Forum and Parliamentary debates to CHSSA in 2002, creating even more opportunities for debaters around California to do what they love. Always there to advocate for doing what is right for our students, Chuck spent two decades working to pass legislation to do just that.

As a Director, Chuck's stature in debate was legendary. He was a great college debater and was proud to be the 8th speaker at the NDT debating for the University of Redlands. He was hired as a teacher and Director of Forensics at Damien High School in August of 1982. Damien High School's long history of success in debate is due in no small part to the work of Chuck Ballingall, however, Chuck's benchmark for success was the long-term achievements of his students, not trophies. He would often tell stories of what his former students were doing, keeping in touch with many of them for years. His legacy of mentorship includes federal judges, business icons, legal scholars, people who make a difference for the less fortunate, and good fathers. As a teacher and coach, he made the world a better place.

Yet, there was always humor. Notoriously, Chuck could make a single wry comment that could both calm down a very tense coaches' meeting and leave everyone laughing to the point of forgetting the cause of tension. It is that approach that made Chuck a meaningful mentor for countless coaches, too. Always patient and willing to make time for questions, many relied on Chuck's sage advice on everything from team building activities to the best squad fundraisers.

Chuck was known for both his wizardry and speed in pairing rounds at prestigious tournaments around the country. Whether at CHSSA State or NSDA (NFL) Nationals, he had a way of making things feel calm and controlled. Above all, Mr. Ballingall taught kindness and this was a lesson he brought with him to tab. Chuck would treat everyone who walked into the tabroom with kindness and respect, but he would also be encouraging, complementary, and genuinely interested in every single person who crossed his path.

While Chuck loved his family dearly, separated by a continent, he only saw them on his annual trip to New Jersey. On the day to day, Chuck's immediate family was Damien and his extended family was the forensics community. Chuck also loved athletics and was known for 35 years at Damien as the "Voice of the Spartans". Chuck enjoyed sports announcing more than anything and was particularly proud of his announcing jobs for the CIF, the Clippers, the Dodgers, and the Quakes, where his distinctive baritone would fill a stadium through the loudspeakers.

Jack Lemmon noted that "Death ends a life, not a relationship". Remembering Chuck's impact helps reaffirm our relationship with him and his relationship to our community. If I had been asked a year ago if Chuck had any children, I would have said "no." Today, I know the truth: he had hundreds, if not thousands. I am fortunate and humbled to be able to consider myself one of them.

IN MEMORIAM



Dr. Minh A. Luong passed awav in October 2017, after a brave fight against heart failure and complications from a stroke. He made a meaningful impact on the world of speech and debate, including many years of service to CHSSA and the NSDA. Dr. Luong was a highly speech successful

and debate competitor at Fremont High School (CA) in the early 1980s, where he was coached by CHSSA legend Carmendale Fernandes. In college he won a national title for UC-Berkeley in Lincoln-Douglas Debate. Later, he would go on to serve as Director of the UC-Berkeley debate program, facilitating the growth of the nationally prominent high school invitational tournament. Dr. Luong also served as a Debate Coach at San Francisco State University, where, while earning a graduate degree, he coached a collegiate national champion.

As a high school coach, Dr. Luong's career included considerable successes at institutions including the Pinewood School in Los Altos Hills, CA. For over a decade he taught numerous summer debate programs for high school students, including stints as the Director of the Lincoln Douglas debate program at the Stanford, UC-Berkeley, and National Debate Forum institutes. Dr. Luong was the also the founder of the Ivy Scholars Program, a highly successful debate summer program which was transformed, under his stewardship, into one of the top youth leadership programs in the nation. He also taught dozens of not-for-profit weekend workshops all across the western United States, targeting areas where experienced coaches were rare, as one of his many service projects. In recognition of his many years of service to the forensics community, Dr. Luong was selected to the National Tournament of Champions Hall of Fame. An article by Dr. Luong, "Forensics and College Admissions," continues to be cited being highly influential in the ongoing discussion about the impact of speech and debate on high school students.

Beyond the world of forensics, Dr. Luong left behind a tremendous legacy, mentoring many hundreds of young leaders from all corners of the world. After working as a top-shelf management consultant, Dr. Luong taught for many years at Yale University, where he served as the Assistant Director of International Security Studies and Associate Director of the Brady-Johnson Institute for Grand Strategy. He also lectured at Brown University, where he taught one of the most popular courses on the campus, "Great Powers and Empires." Dr. Luong also did considerable consulting on national security issues and international affairs, working on behalf of the U.S. Department of Defense and as a diplomat trainer for the United Nations. He leaves behind two twin children – his son Alex and daughter Arista, as well as his ex-wife Pauline Jones-Luong and partner Anni West LaPrise.

Scholarships

Since the 1990 California State Speech Tournament, the California High School Speech Association (CHSSA) has contributed over \$85,000 in scholarship aid to state champions in every event at the state tournament. The scholarship awards were begun through the generosity of many coaches who contributed money to establish a trust fund. Since that time \$150-\$500 for each winner in each event was placed into the scholarship fund from state tournament entry fees.

Many students have been repeat state champions over a span of several years and have received multiple awards. There are several three-time champions who received three awards for their outstanding effort and consistency. In past years, checks were sent directly to the financial aid office of the university where the student was accepted. Beginning with state 2015, however, checks for \$250 per champion are paid directly to the student.

Beginning at state 2016, an annual \$1000 scholarship is awarded each year to the "Most Inspirational Speaker" in Impromptu. The recipient is selected by a vote of the Impromptu finalists at the conclusion of the final round. The scholarship is funded by an annual \$500 anonymous donation that is matched by CHSSA in honor of CHSSA Hall of Fame coach Lynette Williamson.

Beginning at state 2016, an annual \$1000 scholarship is awarded to the Student of the Year. The scholarship is funded by CHSSA.

Anyone may donate funds to the CHSSA Scholarship fund. CHSSA is a non-profit 5013C, educational organization, and all donations are charitable tax deductions. This fundamental dedication to providing a platform for those whose voices deserve elevation is not just limited to Karson's work as a coach. For almost a decade, Karson has tirelessly advocated on the California State Speech Council for equality in opportunity for all students across our state.

His belief that the California High School Speech Association is an equalizer for all students, regardless of their backgrounds, is mirrored in every comment he makes and every piece of legislation he crafts. Always there to volunteer to put in the work necessary to make opportunity a reality, Karson has been a defining voice and advocate through his service to all of us in the speech and debate community.

One thing I have always deeply admired about Karson is the acceptance and respect he shows everyone he encounters, regardless of what differences or unique challenges they face. Karson's message is clear: we each have our burdens, but speech and debate is the path through which our voices can achieve true empowerment. That message is one that is deeply personal for Karson because of his own background, where speech and debate gave him his voice, so that philosophy is no small part of what guides him in how he approaches every aspect of this activity to this day.

Guided by optimism, dedication, and a fundamental belief in the goodness and importance of forensics, we all should hope to be a little more like Karson.


